The improvements you have made in the Bow Wave. Introducing "Feedback". I fought for years to accept "Letters to the Editor" so that views could be aired.

Which leads right into the next topic: My own submission to "Feedback", as follows: Let's keep the decision to use only windwardleeward courses at the CCRs open. We sailed the last CCR at Huntington Lake without reaches. The result was a boring beat upwind and another boring leg downwind. What a sad use of that great sailing venue

Here's why next year we should sail regular Huntington Lake courses:

Reaching legs at Huntington are magic. How often can you get a Lido up on a plane elsewhere?

Who says you can't pass someone on a reach? A reach is a legitimate point of sail, which every skipper must learn to master.

Jibe roundings especially (on a plane-ED) call for seamanship and boat handling not encountered in a straight downwind run. They can definitely cost a position if mishandled.

And let's not overlook those other upwind marks on the way to the windward mark. Each requires its own approach. . Why should we take them out of the skill game? I know the America's entire Cup, purist's arguments for eliminating triangle courses. They shouldn't apply at Huntington Lake. Sailing-its many variable conditions are what make it unique--and fun. FUN! Ask the sailors what they prefer? Boring windward-leeward treks, or a really fun set of challenges and conditions, capped by one of those great reaching planes where the old Lido takes off. My vote is to sail regular Huntington Lake courses at the next CCR

Dave:

My wife me tells me that there is a suggestion to restrict the combined weight of the boat and crew, instead of restricting both separately. Although my wife and I are finally off the board, I would like to express my opinion on this. At first glance, it would seem that this would be an arbitrary decision that would benefit some teams and not others, but that there is no intrinsic reason to favor or disfavor the suggestion. However I think there are two reasons to not make this change:

1. Our "Founding Fathers" undoubtedly debated this point, and probably spent more time on it than we will. Without a strong reason to change the rule. I think we should let it stand.

2. If the ballast is determined by the combined weight of crew and boat, there is an incentive to tailor the boat weight to the crew weight. This is wrong! The rules should encourage everyone to build boats that are the same.

B. Call of fleets: Ten fleet delegates present represented 113 of 150 current members. This constituted the required auorum.

C Minutes of last meeting:

- The minutes from the annual meeting of August 10, 2004 were approved and accepted.
- D Report of executive officers:
- a.) President (Grant Williams): No report.
- b.) Vice President (Allan Stults): Allan asked for bids to host the 2006 CCR.

Dave Smith presented a bid by Fleet 6, Alamitos Bay, CA, to host the regatta to be held at Huntington Lake, CA, on July 10, 11 and 12 following the High Sierra Regatta. Motion passed unanimously.

- d.) Treasurer (Jeanne Smith): The Association has \$9,429.50 cash on hand.
- A complete report of the year's activity was submitted.
- e.) Chief Measurer (Chris Collins, absent): No report.
- E Report of charters granted and revoked: Fleet 8, Sacramento, CA, has been reactivated.

F Unfinished business: A proposal by Joe D'Amico at the 2004 annual board meeting to allow a roller furling jib as approved equipment has been ruled not an approved change by the Board of Directors.

G New business:

Tom Jenkins proposed the following by-law change to Article XV Number 4. The total minimum weight of skipper, crew and ballast shall be three hundred (300) pounds except that the minimum shall be two hundred (200) pounds in the Junior Class Championships. Ballast carried to make up the weight shall not consist of boat "accessories" and shall not be shifted during the race. If a crew's Lido-14 is above the minimum weight of three hundred ten (310) pounds, the additional weight of the boat may be used as a credit towards the minimum weight of the crew. Crews with weight above the minimum required may NOT receive credit towards underweight boats.

Regatta Reports—Championship of Champions Stu Sails in a Destruction Derby

As reported to Dave Carroll by Stu during the event

At the end of the summer sailing season, US Sailing sponsors an event for class champions. The idea is that after this competition the king of the hill is the winner of the *Championship of Champions*. Only one-design class champions, the best of the best, are invited to compete.

The big event was sailed in Flying Scots, at the Bayside Yacht Club in Detroit, MI. Our Champion, Stu Robertson, elected to attend and represent the Lido Class with his top crews, daughter Erin (Fern Ridge 2004) and Paul Anctil (Howard Prairie, 2005) at the shootout of the top guns.

At 5:00 AM pacific time my phone rings...Stu's voice is on the phone.

"I gotta tell you about this regatta, Dave"

What? Where are you?

"In Michigan.... We're sailing in the C of C. I didn't realize what a great handling little boat we sail until I got into one of these things.... It's like driving a barge, they won't hardly turn or anything."

What things?

"Flying Scots..."

OK so tell me about the race....

Well, in the first race it was like blowing 18-20 with gusts over 30. We got a pretty good start and partway up the weather leg something hit us... T-boned on the port side—put a 10 inch hole in the boat. I was knocked off the weather side and smacked the port rail really hard. I've never been hit by anything that hard before.

Erin got a contusion about 6 inches in diameter and Paul split his chin open big time. He was bleeding like a stuck pig, blood all over the boat. He's on blood thinners, so it wouldn't stop and we had to take him to the hospital. They stitched him up and finally got the bleeding stopped....It took 8 stiches."

Sh\$%^. What happened then?

"Everything, racing, was postponed to try to collect the wreckage...boats turned over, bent masts, general carnage. I got a pickup crew from the local club—he was really great—and we could continue racing." What about the wreck?

"Well the kid that hit me, let's call him

'Killer', was a junior champion of something I think, got tossed out of the first race. I suggested that the committee should consider a DSQ under rule 69 since he left

the scene of the accident and continued racing without doing a 720 even. Several of those behind us asked if we needed help, but I thought we were OK. I'm going to seek redress for the incident since we couldn't continue racing."

You always think you're OK when you're really not. Usually the first sign of a concussion.... Where did this guy come from?



"I don't remember very much. I was pretty dizzy, actually I didn't even sail back to the right club to get help for Paul."

That's another sign of a concussion.

"The committee finally said they had considered the DSQ under rule 69 but didn't think it was necessary—after all, it was a high profile event and..."

And? "We don't want to make any waves—you know..."

Later, a call the next day, not at 5:00 AM. Thank you!.

"I think we did pretty good. Maybe finished 4th or 5th. Even won a race. The crew guy, Mr. X—he was really great—said he thought damage on the boat was over 4 figures. It's becoming more clear now—I think the guy who hit us was ducking another starboard tacker....Next day 'Killer' was reaching down the line on port and hit Eduardo (Codrero on starboard) so hard he knocked the anchor out of the boat. I think he (Eduardo) got redress too."

Usually, in the case of a concussion, you remember the last event last—if you ever remember it—Maybe you should see a doctor.

"Yeah, when I get back, but I gotta a lot stuff to do in Bishop and I wanna do the MBYC fall invitational. I think I'll be able to stop by Friday and I then we'll sail at Mission Bay."

Go see a doctor first...

Rub a Dub Dub... Erin, Mr. X, and Stu in the Flying Scot

ED note: Next year the event will be held in Y-Flyers in Littlerock, AK. Issues regarding the event's boat insurance are still to be resolved.

It's great to go neck and neck on every race with such an evenly matched competitor. Sidney Lee, Harold Ho, and Hans Wolff followed us for the next 3 positions.

We've got a big fleet of active Lido sailors – 14 boats raced with us at least once this year (15 counting Joe Davis who only sailed at Districts), which is more than any other FSC fleet. The challenge seems to be getting our sailors to come out more regularly.

Our top 4 finishers for the year were the only 4 sailors who participated regularly, by sailing at least once in all 3 seasons. Seven of our fleet members participated in only one of the season's races, and another 3 missed all three races of one season. The number one factor for top rankings for the season and the year seems to be "just showing up" consistently. Plenty of folks have finished ahead of me all year, but few have come to the regattas as consistently. Though if I can learn to count laps, sail the designated course, and start on time, I may show improvement.

It's also been nice to see how often folks just come down to the lake and pick-up a crew for an unexpected sail (though I can often find crews for folks in advance if you let me know or let everyone know with an E-vite reply). We only had 5 Lidos sail in the fall series. I just don't know how to get more of our Lidos coming out regularly. I am open to any suggestions.

Our District II Championship was the best I've seen, with 11 Lidos on the water, great competition at every level, plenty of wind for 8 fun races, and terrific hospitality. I've emailed the regatta report, so I won't repeat the blow-by-blow here. Sequoia Yacht Club and the race committee (including Chuck St. Dennis and Kathleen & Claude Turner) did a superb job. The BBQ was great, with excellent food, great stories of the day's sail and past adventures, and sailors dancing to the CD Sarah burned for the occasion.

Thanks to Helga and Hans Wolff for organizing the annual Alameda Estuary Cruise. What a wonderful day

We had quite a fleet with Doug's big boat as our safety boat, Chuck's Catalina 22, Aad's Lightning, Paul Morinishi's Flying Scot, in Lidos were Hans & Helga, Sidney, Harold, Me, and Steve brought his Banshee – did I miss anyone? With crew we probably had 50 people having lunch together at Quinn's. The winds were mild but kept us going a good clip and we sailed just about out to the Bay before heading back downwind for lunch. Hans & Helga invented a new form of Sailing Poker, we played on the cruise, and Brigid brought an armory of squirt guns to keep everyone cool and add to the fun (I hope we didn't get anyone too wet).

Perhaps I'll see if Belvedere's a Great Pumpkin is open to outsiders, or go sail with the Cal Sailing Club in Berkley some Sunday. Watch the Fleet 62 e-mail list for ideas, or post your own suggestions and comments.

Fleet 81 2005 Waldo Lake Camp/Sail/Race August 27, 2005

"As good as it gets!" describes our Waldo Lake sailing. Located in the Willamette National Forest, this natural volcanic/glacier formed mountain lake at 5414 ft. elevation boasts the 2nd clearest & cleanest water in the world with 120-foot deep visibility through cobalt blue water. Forested peaks surround the lake with many rock islands just off shore. "Idyllic" personifies this Oregon Beauty!

This was our 4th annual Lido Fleet 81 outing to sail together in this rarefied Cascade Mountain air and our 1st group race. And, a truly fun race (with some mishaps) it was to Rhododendron Island beach for lunch and back to Islet Point launch. In all, 7 Lidos enjoyed sunny 85-degree weather with winds gusting to 15 knots as the boats skimmed the blue lake surface over depths of up to 420 feet.

The mishaps took place mainly with Lidos having fixed rudders at the shallow launch and boats scraping submerged rocks close to shore while under sail. The 6000 series rudders proved to be especially difficult to install under sail while older boats with swing rudders adapted easily to the circumstances. One boat attempted to sail out of the cove with only the jib (big mistake) ending up on the cove's rocky shoreline. Unfortunately, several hulls, rudders and centerboards sustained minor damage. This became a significant learning experience about shallow natural terrain navigating for novice lake cruising sailors.

In fact, this concept of beach/shallow water launching was foreign to many skippers. I've had years of enjoyment sailing to Waldo's beautiful sandy beaches in my '69 built Lido. Serious consideration should be given to the choice of boat design so as to not eliminate this great sailing option. The shallow launch and beaching aspect of the versatile Lido 14 was, undoubtedly, one of the builders original design considerations. Much of this application appears to have been lost with the advent of the 6000 series focus on racing.

The rocky shoreline and outcroppings of this natural lake make constant vigilance essential. However, the rewards of sailing on this 6,298 acre lake with its 22 miles of shoreline are without comparison. The winds typically fill-in by mid morning and stay relatively constant until sunset. A late summer visit will avoid the hordes of mosquitoes that torment campers earlier in the season.

The Rhododendron Island race winner won a West Marine gift certificate, but all participants are sure to exclaim that just being there was the best part of our outing.

Next year's camping and launch will be at the North Waldo site with its deep water harbor. Warning buoys will mark underwater rock outcroppings close to shore to help protect sailors and their equipment. Mooring anchors will be set just outside the harbor for those who prefer to rig their boats in deeper open water. And, the 2006 Waldo Lake race may be around buoyed marks. For the sake of including Lidos of all designs these race preparations are well worth the effort to enjoy sailing together on Waldo Lake

Meanwhile, adventurous sailors who crave warm sand between their toes may be found sipping a "cold one" on one of Waldo's private pristine beaches.

Technical Stuff Dialing in the 6000 Series Lido Part 4 of many

Lucky Larry had an early 6000 series boat and was confounded by problems with centerboard adjustments, lines sticking between the side of the trunk and the board head etc.

Part of the difficulty with the board rigging was corrected by Joe D'Amico and the factory revised the design of the uphaul hanger to a "T" shape which included a block and reduced the friction of the line exiting through the single sheave through deck block at the front of the trunk. Lucky was reluctant to install the new hanger because it was expensive and required match drilling the mounting holes from the previous model. Besides that Lucky was not sure the system would work better. Instead, another possible fix was discovered.

By hanging a Harken 415 sheave in the end of an original headstay adjuster on the sheave bolt located in the upper front of the trunk the angle the line turned was reduced by 50% in 2 places and the friction caused by the single



sheave through deck was eliminated by replacing it with a Harken 368 block, having 2 sheaves and eliminating line chafe previously caused by the single through deck sheave.and the sheave inside the top front of the trunk.

Additional improvements were possible by going to a double purchase lifting line and replacing the large (relatively) turning block at the end of the bracket with a much smaller Harken 404 Airblock and installing a spacer to dead-end the line from the small block on the centerboard head (required for the 2:1 purchase). Of course Lucky had to pull twice as far to get the board up but the effort was significantly less. By lowering the block on the bracket toward the bottom of the boat Lucky was assured of better purchase at the end of raising the board and could actually get the board in the trunk for launching from the trailer (After he had ground out some offending material at the top of the trunk which hit the trailing edge of the board.) Lowering the board hangers to make the leading edge even with the bottom (when the board was lifted) also made for more room in the trunk for the board.

By using a clear plastic centerboard cap Lucky was able to relocate the up haul block forward to keep his line clear of the board head. Additionally the ability to see down into the trunk provided the opportunity to see what was causing the problem, maybe if Lucky installs a "fishing hole" he will be able to extricate the offending line with a suitable hook and be able to continue sailing.

Shimming the excess clearance between the board head and the trunk wall is also an important detail. Lines can't get into slots that are too small to permit entry.

Locating the pivot point. In the racer's mind there is only one position for the board—maximum aft (95") and maximum down (48 $\frac{1}{2}$ "). These dimensions have proven fast and are nearly always found on the most competitive boats. Naturally the factory doesn't strive to set these dimensions because of manufacturing tolerances. They make the setup to achieve nominal dimensions and as a result the hole in the factory board is nearly always further back and further down than the

racer wants. If one orders a new boat for racing they should not have the centerboard installed for they will surely have holes to fill and re-drill. For the owner of a older but box stock boat the re-drilling situation might be better accomplished by having special hangers made and not weakening the board further by adding holes which are in the water and at a high



stress area. The photo below shows a modified set of hangers being installed on a 6000 series factory board. Notice that the 45 degree line on the board is the key to all solutions of the hanger pin location. In other words the pin could have been higher and further aft, or lower and further forward. The lower line represents the 48 ½" mark from the tip of the board and the keel

line of the boat. Care must be taken with these hangers to make sure the bushing for the pin is wide enough to keep the hangers tightly located (sideways) in the slot at all times.

The new series Lido rudder was revised to allow conventional pintles and gudgeons for hinges. This was perceived as a Godsend for "classic" Lido owners whom were finding the aluminum rudder casting difficult and expensive to replace. Rule changes allowed this system to be installed on the classics and used as a replacement. Unfortunately, problems were found in the new system. Rudder loads previously absorbed in the robust aluminum casting overwhelmed the lower pintles and fatigue failures began to show up. In the 2003 Championships Brian Janney and Roger Patterson both had failures which cost a race in the Gold Flight. The factory converted from the original Schaeffer hardware to Racelite hardware. To date, there have been no known failures of the Racelite system, but the wakeup call was

issued. The light Racelite pintles are the same diameter as the original. The material thickness of the support is 1/64" (.078" instead of .063") thicker and 1/8" wider. Medium Racelite pintles are 3/8" diameter and **MUCH** more robust. Naturally holes don't line up with the original stuff.

Note that the hinges (pintles and gudgeons) have been rotated to a vertical axis parallel to the transom. The rudder side force (100#) was replaced with a moment and a force and relocated in line with the hinges. Reactions are 18 # at the end of the tiller/hiking stick. A substantial force of 208# is at the lower pintle and 108# at the upper pintle. The moment caused by the offset of the tiller from the upper pintle may vary depending how the boat is set up is relatively inconsequential in magnitude anyway.

Even though the force on the tiller at the hiking stick is only 18# and the load possible (with a Lido going at full speed upwind~10 ft/second) on the center of pressure on the rudder is 100#, and the reaction on the lower pintles is huge. This condition won't last very long as the boat will turn, but in the case of a sudden puff, or a T-bone collision at the aft part of the boat, the loads shown can be generated momentarily without the rudder stalling or ventilating. Lesser loads, from steering repeatedly, chop in heavy air, etc, will fatigue the stainless steel pintle mounting plate beginning at the hole (of course) where there is less area and a stress concentration.

Next year, with the Class Championships at Huntington Lake, a long way from a marine hardware store, swapping out the pntles might be seriously considered. Be prepared and have fun!
